

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Resolutions....

Our in-theround staging makes it difficult to do some plays, but other than that we'll listen to any suggestion.

Second, I resolve to see more plays, especially student productions. While I absolutely appreciate and encourage our community to support OUR productions, our local schools need our support as well. Even if you don't have kids in the school, supporting the arts in schools is so important. Please get people thinking "STEAM", not just "STEM". I can tell you from personal experience that the Arts and STEM both have a lot to offer each other. And when students get involved in CP productions and activities, they always teach us a thing or two.

Lastly, I resolve to get my program notes finished in a more timely manner. I'm sure the Marketing Director (who is responsible for programs) will appreciate it.

May all YOUR resolutions be kept in 2024....

Edd has found time in between these productions to direct for other groups. design sets, and when possible do some acting. After retiring Edd was a standardized patient working with all the local teaching hospitals in the area. In the last few years he has joined the set construction crew at CP. Edd studied Theater at Chicago's Goodman Theatre.



ABOUT THE AUTHOR

JORDAN HARRISON was a 2015 Pulitzer Prize finalist for Marjorie Prime. The play had its New York premiere at Playwrights Horizons and its Chicago premiere at Writers Theatre after premiering at the Mark Taper Forum/CTG in Los Angeles. His play Maple and Vine premiered in the 2011 Humana Festival at Actors Theatre of Louisville and went on to productions at American Conservatory Theatre and Playwrights Horizons, among others, Harrison's other plays include The Grown-Up (2014 Humana Festival), Doris to Darlene (Playwrights Horizons), Amazons and their Men (Clubbed Thumb), Act A Lady (2006 Humana Festival), Finn in the Underworld (Berkeley Repertory Theatre), Futura (Portland Center Stage, NAATCO), Kid-Simple (2004 Humana Festival), Standing on Ceremony (Minetta Lane), The Museum Play (Washington Ensemble Theatre)

and a musical, Suprema (O'Neill Music Theatre Conference).

Harrison is the recipient of a Guagenheim Fellowship, a Hodder Fellowship, the Kesselring Prize, the Roe Green Award from Cleveland Play House, the Heideman Award, a Theater Masters Innovative Playwright Award, the Loewe Award for Musical Theater, Jerome and McKnight Fellowships, a NYSCA grant, and a NEA/TCG Residency with The Empty Space Theater. His children's musical, The Flea and the Professor, won the Barrymore Award for Best Production after premiering at the Arden Theatre. A graduate of Stanford University and the Brown MFA program, Harrison is an alumnus of New Dramatists. He is an Affiliated Artist with Clubbed Thumb, The Civilians and The Playwrights' Center. Harrison writes for the Netflix original series Orange is the New Black.

Marjorie Prime marks her fourth onstage appearance with The Colonial Players, having played in Lucky Stiff, The Curious Savage, and in Christopher Durang's 'dentity Crisis, part of the Shades of Grey One-Act Festival. Jeanne received her BA in Theatre Arts and French from Simpson College in Iowa, then completed the Professional Actors' Training Program at Circle in the Square Theatre in NYC.



10 Early Signs and Symptoms of Alzheimer's and Dementia

Memory loss that disrupts daily life may be a symptom of Alzheimer's or other dementia. Alzheimer's is a brain disease that causes a slow decline in memory, thinking and reasoning skills. There are 10 warning signs and symptoms. If you notice any of them, don't ignore them. Schedule an appointment with your

- 1. Memory loss that disrupts daily life One of the most common signs of Alzheimer's disease, especially in the early stage, is forgetting recently learned information. Others include forgetting important dates or events, asking the same questions over and over, and increasingly needing to rely on memory aids (e.g., reminder notes or electronic devices) or family members for things they used to handle on their own.
- 2. Challenges in planning or solving problems Some people living with changes in their memory due to Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience changes in their ability to develop and follow a plan or work with numbers. They may have trouble following a familiar recipe or keeping track of monthly bills. They may have difficulty concentrating and take much longer to do things than they did before.
- **Difficulty completing familiar tasks** People living with memory changes from Alzheimer's or other dementia often find it hard to complete daily tasks. Sometimes they may have trouble driving to a familiar location, organizing a grocery list or remembering the rules of a favorite game.
- Confusion with time or place People living with Alzheimer's or other dementia can lose track of dates, seasons and the passage of time. They may have trouble understanding something if it is not happening immediately. Sometimes they may forget where they are or how they got there.
- Trouble understanding visual images and spatial relationships Some people living with Alzheimer's or other dementia could experience vision changes. This may lead to difficulty with balance or trouble reading. They may also have problems judging distance and determining color or contrast, causing issues with driving.
- New problems with words in speaking or writing People living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may have trouble following or joining a conversation. They may stop in the middle of a conversation and have no idea how to continue or they may repeat themselves. They may struggle with vocabulary, have trouble naming a familiar object or use the wrong name (e.g., calling a "watch" a "hand-clock").
- 7. Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps A person living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may put things in unusual places. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them again. He or she may accuse others of stealing, especially as the disease progresses.
- **Decreased or poor judament** Individuals living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience changes in judgment or decision-making. For example, they may use poor judgment when dealing with money or pay less attention to grooming or keeping themselves clean.
- Withdrawal from work or social activities A person living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience changes in the ability to hold or follow a conversation. As a result, they may withdraw from hobbies, social activities or other engagements. They may have trouble keeping up with a favorite team or activity.
- 10. Changes in mood and personality Individuals living with Alzheimer's or other dementia may experience mood and personality changes. They can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful or anxious. They may be easily upset at home, with friends or when out of their comfort zone.
